### In memory of Cllr Nigel Gawthrope

(who passed away on the 12 January 2019)

remember that cold Christmas afternoon, on the I2th December 2019, when Nigel came to 'Switch the Lights On' at Arbury Court. This has always been a lively and well attended event, that has been going on in our community for more than 20 years. It is an important occasion for us as the local Mayor and councillors had always been invited and every year the Mayor is expected to switch the lights on.

I vividly remember Nigel's face when the lights on the tree at Arbury Court didn't light up after he pushed the stick on the wooden device. set for the occasion, I could also say the same for Reverent David Maher, but this is depicted eloquently on the photo on the right, as we commonly say: "Images speak louder than words". Nigel pressed the stick again, wishing for a miraculous reaction that could bring light to the puzzled audience. Unfortunately, this didn't work and we were forced to switch the lights on by hand . Nigel took the whole experience with calm manner, like nothing had happened, made a few jokes and we all ended up laughing blaming technology as usual, Again a great attitude from a good leader in moments of adversity.

I had only met Nigel recently at the NCCP AGM in June 2018, in which he signed his name to become an active member of the NCCP management committee. Nigel's eloquent words filled the room at the Nun's Way Pavilion, with hope and commitment and it became apparent to me, that I was blessed with the opportunity to meet somebody special. Nigel's aura and charisma filled the room as his personality and interpersonal skills were hard to match.

One attribute that I am sure is shared by many is that Nigel was a good listener, which is something hard to come by in modern politics. I could also describe Nigel as a person with the capacity to make you feel good, not only as an individual but also as part of a community group with a cause worth fighting





for He listened carefully to our presentation and what the local community, in the North of Cambridge, had to say about the issues in the area and daily problems.

I couldn't comment more on Nigel as a person as I hardly knew him, but I was aware of his background and track record in regards to community work. We were all delighted with his contribution and plans to improve the living and educational standards in the North of Cambridge. We hope that someone would be able to follow his footsteps, but this will be a difficult task as people like Nigel are rare to find. Nigel remains an irreplaceable contributor to our community and will never be forgotten.

### The Future of Lawrence Way

### Our community House...


s you might be aware there has been some discussions with the council, regarding No 37 Lawrence Way, our community house. As a result No 37 will need to go back to be part of the council housing stock. We have had several meetings with the council and we are pleased to let you know that the Redevelopment of 67 to 97a Campkin Road has been drafted and shared with us. Cambridge Investment Partnership (CIP) is proposing to build 78 new councilrented homes and a new community facility on Campkin Road. The new high-quality and energyefficient homes will replace the existing twostorey flats. The 74 apartments and four houses will be one and two-bedroom properties. The layout of each of these apartments is set out to maximise space, light and efficiency and will satisfy the space standards set out in the Cambridge City Council Local Plan.



The new Community Centre will be located at the north front of the site, following the amenity space along the northern edge of the site, behind the tree line. A new and modern centre is what the community needs and we are delighted to share the good news with the local community. The new proposed centre will not only bring more suitable space but a better layout to run local activates and projects. A new community centre will bring some benefits as follows;

- The new centre will be on the ground floor and fully accessible for wheelchairs.
- There will be a more functional, spacious areas that could be adaptable for a variety of uses.
- It will have a fitted kitchenette.
- Accessible toilets and baby changing facilities.
- There will be a large function room.
- It will provide an outdoor space, near the shared green space on the corner of the Campkin Road.
- One disabled parking space and bicycle racks.



These workshops are part of an inequality art project, which is a collaboration between The Cambridge Commons and Pivotal.



NCCP are working in partnership with Cambridge City Council, Red Hen Project and The Raspberry Pi Foundation, offering local children a chance to learn computer programming. With the help of brilliant volunteers, children can now attend the CoderDojo every Tuesday 4:00pm to 5:30 at Nunsway pavilion.

Tom Hadfield from Raspberry Pi said, "The CoderDojo movement believes that an understanding of programming languages is increasingly important in the modern world, that it's both better and easier to learn these skills early, and that nobody should be denied the opportunity to do so. Anyone aged seven to seventeen can visit a Dojo where they can learn to code, build a website, create an app or a game, and explore technology in an informal, creative, and social environment. There are over 2000 active Dojos in 107 countries, regularly attended by 58,000 young people."

Matt Nelson, Digital Inclusion Projects Officer at Cambridge City Council has provided new laptops for use at the CoderDojo and said, "I am very happy to be working with NCCP to offer children who might not have a computer or internet access at home the opportunity to have fun whilst learning new skills. Nun's Way was chosen as the first venue to benefit from this funding and I hope this is the start of many more projects aimed at giving everybody, regardless of their circumstances, the chance to develop their digital confidence".

Sarah Crick from Red Hen Project said: "Giving families we work with the chance to engage with coding is a fantastic opportunity. Cambridge is such a centre of excellence in the tech space it would be great if we can 'grow-our-own' and give those in North Cambridge an opportunity to benefit from the city's growth in this sector. Encouraging children to have aspirations and a sense of the possible is so important to their wellbeing and crucial for their future life prospects".

Home-grown fruit and vegetables are enjoying a huge success, growing your own food is more popular than ever and never had been such a demand for allotments. Much of this interest comes from our desire to live healthy lives and what we eat plays a vital role. In addition keeping a plot can be better exercise that going to the local gym. Another important reason for this renaissance could be due to the increasing concern about industrialisation and commercial

food production. There is no better place to grow organic food than in your very own allotment.

The team behind the Carnival is a diverse group who have been recruited over the last few years to carry on the dedicated work of previous committee members.

There is still room for more community minded individuals, to bring their own enthusiasm to the team though. You don't need experience, although it helps, as the existing team is now familiar with the Carnival running and will support you at all times. This year we're looking for people to help with publicity and social media, logistics and stalls management in particular.

Helen, the Chairperson, only joined the committee last year and said I was new to the area but the friendly team put their trust in me and supported me through my first year.

# The Cambridge Commons

### **Campaigning for more equality in Cambridge**

Did you know that Cambridge is one of the most unequal cities in the UK? That's according to a report in 2018 by the Centre for Cities. And on average someone living in Kings Hedges can expect to live 9 years less than a resident of Newnham! Inequality harms everyone in a community: bus services are worse when better-off people don't use them for example, and that leads to more congestion and poorer air quality for everyone.


At The Cambridge Commons, a group of volunteers is campaigning to get these issues tackled with practical actions by the Council, businesses and the universities in our City. We were inspired by 'The Spirit Level' and the national campaign by The Equality Trust. We want people in the City to be more aware of inequality so that everyone can do their bit:

- Running a small business: do you pay staff the real living wage?
- Voting: are you thinking about which candidates are talking about tackling inequality?
- Shopping: do you support your local shops rather than big chains?
- Working for a big company: can you get involved in workplace volunteering schemes or lobby for union representation?
- Residents: are you having your say in consultations on new roads and housing to make sure that planners are considering the impacts on inequality in transport access and homes?

We've been talking to people in the city about their experiences of inequality and we have dozens of stories of how people feel excluded by poor bus services, by being treated unfairly because of their race, and by how expensive and difficult it is to find good housing. One person told us: "My son has a disability and to get around with him I have to take the bus. However, I don't get reduced bus fares, only him." And another said "Where I live is a lovely flat but it is social housing and all the parking spots have been sold off (to private owners). There is class division. We can't park and can't have visitors."

We've also supported a project to get local artists involved in making artworks that convey the experience of living with disadvantage: watch out for our event to showcase what the artists created at the Grafton Centre on 11th January!

We're working with other campaigners as well as with the City Council's Anti-Poverty Unit, to get the word out. Every 1st Wednesday of the month, we have a


# Fund your community project with an Area Committee grant

### **Save St Albans Road Recreation Ground**

Friends of St Albans Road rec was started to save the green space of St Albans Road rec from being built on. We have no objection to the redevelopment of the Meadows Community Centre on its current footprint with buildings not exceeding the height of 2-storey houses on neighbouring Kings Meadows estate, Arbury Road and St Albans Road and keeping our green space building free. Green space north of the river is extremely limited. St Albans Road rec is circled in red. This area has high building density.

Cambridge City Council's Open Space and Recreation Strategy 2011 and the Local Plan 2018 list St Albans Road rec as 'protected' from building. Building is therefore not planled. The table below shows Arbury has the second highest population and lowest total green space in 2009. Population will have increased in a decade.



Below is green space south of the river – a clear difference.

#### How much can you apply for?

You can apply for up to £1,000. You must be able to evidence how you would match fund a grant by a minimum of 10%. For example, this could be volunteering hours, donations or entry fees such as 50p over the course of the project, or the donation and loan of resources from

other community assets such as your children's centre, school, nursery, library, church etc.

### CAMBRIDGE STREET AID

Cambridge Street Aid helps people get off, and stay off, the streets. You can give to Street Aid rather than handing money directly to people on the streets, and every single penny raised goes to grants to help people leave the streets behind.



This year sees the very first Street Aid Week, 14-18th October. Look out for events near you and join in online using @camstreetaid and #StreetAidWeek.

Street Aid aims to raise £2,500 during the week, to fund grants for 10 people.

People like Tom\*, who had an alcohol addiction that led to him losing his job and becoming homeless. Tom found accommodation and worked hard to detox, then applied for a Street Aid grant to pay for a security course. Tom passed the course with flying colours and started security work straight away.

Tom says: "Not being employed for a year, you lose confidence. Security work was perfect to build my confidence because I could pick and choose shifts. I was in control.

"For me, doing the course was a massive part of the puzzle. Now I'm working full time. I'm so thankful for Street Aid being able to fund my course, it really got me set back up for life."


